Mr. Paul Nantulya is Research Associate at the Africa Center for Strategic Studies at National Defense University. His research interests center on African security issues, and China-Afro-Asia engagements. His book manuscript examines the influence of traditional Chinese strategic culture on China's naval strategy in the Western Pacific. Other publications include a co-authored book chapter with Raymond Gilpin and Phillip Carter in *China's Global Reach: A Security Assessment,* (Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies, forthcoming in 2019) an article titled, *Dynamics of Conflict between China and the United States* to be published by the S Rajaratnam School for International Studies in Singapore, and a chapter titled *Understanding China's Strategic Application of Soft Power with Specific Reference to Africa,* (University of Nairobi, forthcoming in 2019).

Previously, Nantulya served USAID contractor, CRS, in several capacities in Kenya, Sudan, and South Sudan between 2007 and 2011, including as an advisor to the Government of South Sudan. Prior to this he worked for the Africa Center for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes (ACCORD) in Durban, where he conducted peacekeeping courses for civilian and military peacekeepers at staff colleges across Southern Africa as well as in-mission training for deployed peacekeepers in the field, and post-mission lessons learned from those operations. He was on ACCORD's supporting staffs for President Nelson Mandela at the Arusha Peace Talks on Burundi (1999-2001), President Thabo Mbeki at the Burundi Ceasefire Talks (2001-2003), and President Ketumile Masire of Botswana, at the Congolese talks held in Sun City, South Africa. (2002/3).

Nantulya has studied traditional Korean combat arts and philosophy, attaining dan (expert) rank at age 27 from Kukkiwon, Korea, and higher certifications at age 31 and 36. He holds a B.A. in International Relations from United States International University in Nairobi, Kenya, with a Japanese language specialization, and an MS in Defense and Strategic Studies from Missouri State University. He is also a graduate of the Japan Africa Culture Interchange Institute of Kenya (1995-1999) and an active member of the Japan America Society of Washington DC.
