J. Michael Dahm is Senior Resident Fellow for Aerospace and China Studies at the Mitchell Institute for Aerospace Studies, where he focuses on original research, threat-informed assessments, and recommendations for aerospace policy, strategy, and technology.

Prior to joining Mitchell, Mr. Dahm worked for federally funded research organizations, the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory and then the MITRE Corporation, supporting advanced research & development programs and advising sponsors across the U.S. national security enterprise. He retired from the U.S. Navy having served for over 25 years as an intelligence officer in several diverse staff and operational assignments including combat tours in the Balkans and Southwest Asia. Mr. Dahm has focused on Indo-Pacific security issues since 2006 when he was assigned to the U.S. Pacific Command. He later served as the Assistant Naval Attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing, China. In his final tour, he was the Senior Naval Intelligence Officer for China at the Office of Naval Intelligence.

Mr. Dahm has taught graduate courses at the National Intelligence University (NIU) and is currently a Lecturer at the Elliot School of International Affairs at the George Washington University where he teaches a course on China's military. Mr. Dahm is active in the open-source intelligence community and has published extensively on Indo-Pacific military and security issues.

Mr. Dahm received a B.A. in international relations from the University of Southern California. He earned an M.S. in strategic intelligence from the National Intelligence University (NIU). *Mr. Dahm has not previously testified before the Commission.*
